



Planning for the Future



This year, SHAS will be working on a 7-year school strategic plan (SSP) as part of our MNSAA (Minnesota Nonpublic School Accrediting Association) accreditation renewal. SHAS is now on its 7th year of its 7-year accreditation cycle, where we are tasked to develop a new 7-year SSP. As part of our staff professional development last Friday, we began work on developing our first objective, which regards technology advancements at SHAS. So far, the main plan for this objective is to obtain the best choice of technological devices for the students in the classroom. Research will play a large part in carrying out this objective as there are many options available. As we continue with this objective and other objectives to come, we invite all stakeholders to share their input for the future advancements of SHAS. Currently, each of our classrooms have a teacher computer, two student com-puters, two iPads, and an interactive board with projector.

The students will be making pies on October 18th. Each student should bring an apple so they can make their own personal apple pie to bring home.



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

The third grade room has been bursting with activity. In math we have completed our work on place value and rounding but continue to practice these skills through an on-line educational program called prodigy. Teachers are able to plan and schedule what topics the students will cover and get updated reports on student progress. The students love playing it whenever they can and some are even playing it at home. In social we have been learning about early communities and how they grew from a few small houses to towns with many businesses. This sparked an interest in the students as to what the settlers really had to endure when building up a community out of nothing so we began to find out with the help of the "Great Pioneer Town STEM Challenges". This includes 5 different challenges that help the settlers as they claim land and build a new town. The first challenge was called "Thirsty Travelers". Their mission was to design and make a water filter for the settlers to use so they could drink the murky river water. A given set of supplies were available to use and a few requirements were given. The group had to design a sketch, label materials needed, work as a group to make it, test the results, and if needed, change things up for success. The next challenge was to design and construct a cabin to withstand a wind storm. With given supplies and being guided by a few requirements the teams have been working very hard on these and they will be ready for testing soon. The students have also been working on a research report of an ocean animal of their choice. They were to find and take notes on information about the animal's diet, behavior, enemies, defenses, and a few other interesting facts that they wanted to add to their report.
